Festus High School To Honor Douglass School Alumni

On Tuesday, January 21, Festus High School will honor all Douglass School alumni at a special event and basketball game that day. During the day, special displays around the school will outline the history of the school. All students will be given the opportunity to see the exhibits to learn more about the school's history. That night, the displays will be open to the public to view before and during the boys varsity basketball game versus Crystal City. For the game, each team will wear replica Douglass Trojans uniforms and all Douglass alumni in attendance will be recognized.

Douglass School, opened in 1900 as an early grade school, educating African-American students from Festus. Douglass Cooperative High School opened in 1939 for African-American students from Festus, Crystal City, Herculaneum, De Soto, Bonne Terre, Farmington and Potosi. The high school was integrated into Festus High School in 1955. Students in grades 7 and 8 were integrated into Festus Schools in 1956 and in 1959 the Douglass School closed. Festus

Superintendent Ralph B. Tynes was the man behind the integration of Douglass School into the Festus School system. The history of Douglass School is important to the history of Festus and Festus Schools. Let me begin by saying - Happy New Year - as we commence the second half of our school year. It's hard to believe we are now halfway through our current school year. However, the end of 1st semester presented us challenges via mother nature. Tech Talk

If you spend any time on the internet you have passwords, likely on multiple sites (SISk12, email, Facebook, Twitter, Snapchat, Instagram, etc). However if you are like most humans, you reuse passwords across several sites. Password reuse can result in exposing your accounts to “hackers”. Below I will cover a few ways to help protect your online accounts from being compromised by the bad guys.

First let's start with the simple truth that your passwords have likely been exposed by at least one breach. You can visit haveibeenpwned.com and enter your email address; it will tell you if your email address was exposed in any of the recent online breaches. Chances are it has been.

The first step I recommend is to use a password manager of some sort and not your browser's password manager. I use LastPass.com as my password manager, but there are others like 1Password, KeePass and Dashlane.

These tools will help you create strong and unique passwords for each site. This is crucial. As an example, let's pretend your facebook password is exposed. If you use that same username/password combo for your email account, then your email account is exposed as well. Unique passwords are very important since they compartmentalize exposure. I highly recommend using a password manager of some sort.

Another step I recommend to users is to enable Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) or 2 Factor Authentication (2FA). MFA and 2FA work by sending you a confirmation code to enter when you log into a website before fully gaining access. Here's an example: I log into Facebook on a new computer. I will then get a text message to my phone with a secret code. Facebook will ask me to enter the secret code from my phone before being able to log in. This keeps bad guys from gaining access because even if they know your password, they would need physical access to your cell phone to get the secret code. Most if not all online accounts support MFA including Gmail, Facebook, and Twitter. If you need help enabling MFA for a site you can google it-- “enable facebook mfa”.

These are rather simple steps you can take to protect your private accounts online. I highly recommend using both a password manager to create and save unique passwords for each site and enabling Multi-Factor authentication on all accounts that support it. The Festus R6 Nursing Department hopes you and yours had a blessed holiday season. As we get back into the school routine and start our second semester, we would like to offer some tips to help keep your child healthy and flu-free.

Viruses spread easily among children in schools. You can help prevent the spread of the flu and other illnesses by following a few simple steps.

- If possible, you and your child should get a flu vaccine.
- Remind your child to cover his or her nose and mouth with a tissue when sneezing or coughing and dispose of the tissue immediately. If no tissue is available, sneeze or cough into your elbow.
- Have your child wash his or her hands frequently with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds.
- Disinfect frequently touched surfaces and shared items.
- Teach your child not to touch his or her mouth, nose, and eyes. If your child is sick, keep him or her at home to prevent the spread of illnesses to others.
- If sick, your child needs to remain home from school until he or she is diarrhea, vomit, and fever free for at least 24 hours without the use of medications.

6. Just like school, your bus is a bully-free zone. Be sure to report any bullying to your bus driver.

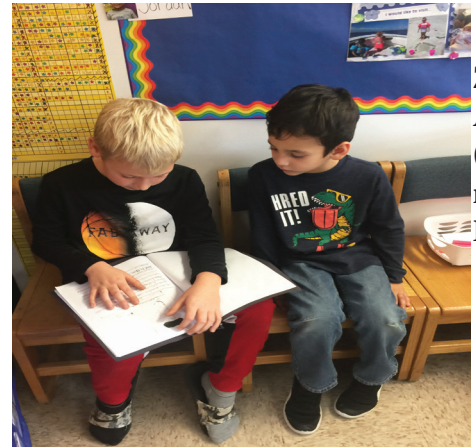

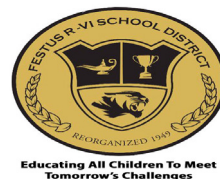
Festus Intermediate School Receives Grant

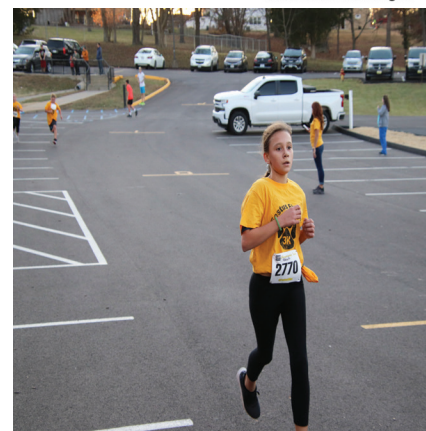
Educating All Children To Meet Tomorrow's Challenges
